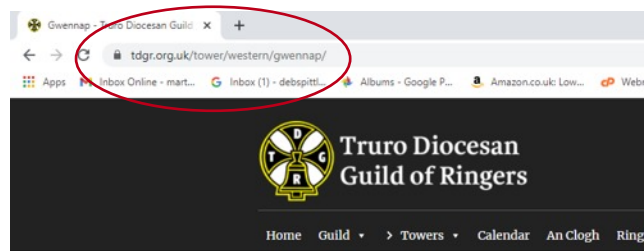


How to create a QR code you can use for your tower

1) Open up your tower page on the tdgr.org.uk website and copy the URL (internet address) at the top.

I will use Gwennap as an example.

(Select it and Right click then Copy or Ctrl+c)



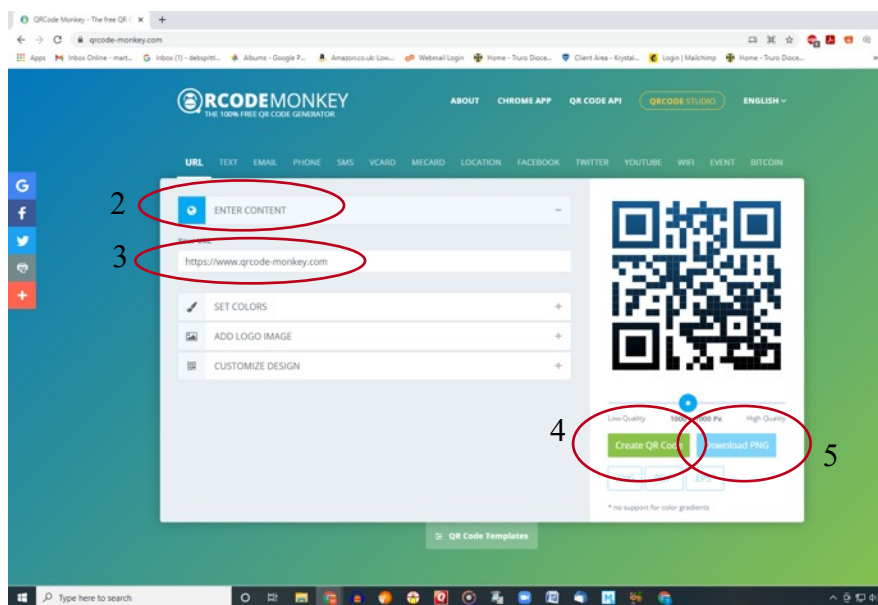
2) Open up another tab in your browser and go to a free QR code generator. There are many available online, the free ones produce a 'static' code meaning once produced, it will always link to one web page.

I used <https://www.qrcode-monkey.com/>

If not already open, click on <Enter Content>

3) Paste your URL into the URL box. Right click and click paste or Ctrl+v

You can add images and change the colours in the boxes below but you don't have to. Eg you could add a photo of your church or of the guild badge. See below.

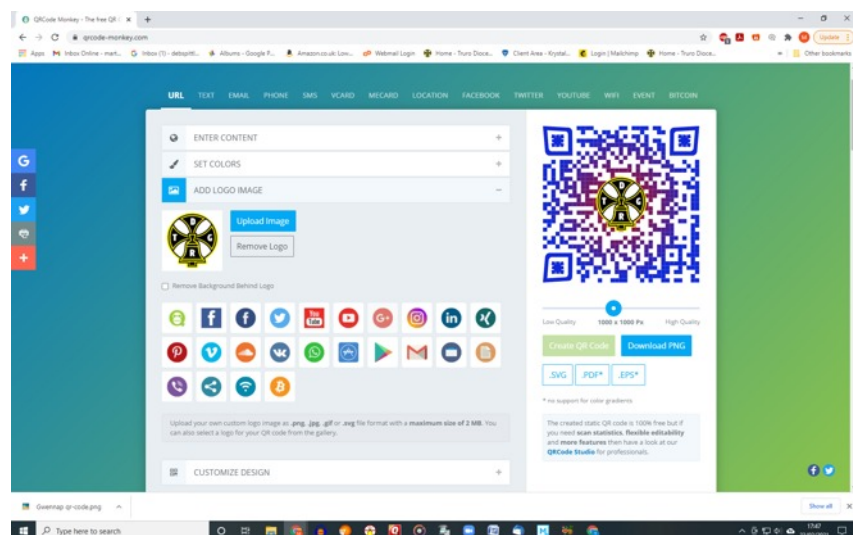


4) Click on create QR code to see your design

5) Once happy with your design then click <download png> and save it.

To download a photo or the logo from the website, find the image you want on the site, Right click on it and click save image & Save on your computer, or just copy the image.

Then in the QR generator, Click Add logo/image, click upload image, and find the one you just saved. - Or just paste it if you'd copied it.



The final part of the process involves opening the QR image in a word processor (eg Word) or in a desktop publishing app, and add some welcoming words and instructions. Something suggesting you can scan this with a QR code scanner app on your phone!

Print, Laminate (or plastic sleeve) and pin to the church porch notice board but only once you have obtained permission to do so from the church warden or incumbent.

Putting it up on a community notice board or nearby shop window is also a great plan but again must be done with permission. Please post it securely as we wouldn't want to be accused of littering.

See the example below for what can quickly and easily be produced (Try scanning it to see how well it can work)
